REPUBLIC OF THE PEILIPPINES

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AFFIDAVIT

I, BALTAZAR AQUINO, of legal age, married and with residence at No. 51 Times Street, Quezon City, Metro Manila, after hering been duly sworn in accordance with law, do hereby depose and say:

- 1. As stated in my previous affidavits submitted to the Presidential Commission on Good Government (copies of which are attached hereto as Exhibits A, E, and C and are incorporated herein by this reference), during the period from 1975 through 1981 I received funds in Hong Kong on numerous occasions from Japanese businessmen on behalf of Mr. Harcos. The purpose of this affidavit is to provide further details of my knowledge of these transactions, and of some of the background respecting these transactions. The facts stated herein are true of my own personal knowledge. If called me a witness, I could and would testify competently to the facts stated herein.
- 2. Beginning in 1975, Mr. Marcos asked he to go to Hong Hong on various occasions to collect conmissions from Japanese traders who were willing to pay Mr. Marcos a "commission" in return for being assured that the particular Japanese trading company with which they were associated would receive a desired contract. The commissions were generally paid to Mr. Marcos in the amount of ten or fifteen percent of the contract price.
 - Pursuant to the arrangement worked out with the Japanese traders, the ten or fifteen percent commission paid to Mr. Marcos would be included within the total contract price paid by the Philippines. Thus, for example, if a contract was priced at \$100,000, \$10,000 or \$15,000 of the contract price paid by the Philippines would be allocated for the commission to be received by Mr. Marcos. Of course, the fact that Mr. Marcos received this commission was kept secret.
- 4. While I was collecting these commissions for Mr. Harcos, I collected only for contracts with Japanese traders involving Public Highway projects. All collections of Marcos commissions for non-highway projects were, to my knowledge, handled by General Eulogio Balao and Andres Genito.
 - I am aware that the late General Balao handled the receipt of such commissions on behalf of Mr. Marcos because, prior to his death in August 1877, Gen. Balao told me that he was

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doing this. Futbermore, after Gen. Balao's death, Mr. Marcos became concerned that Andres Genito, who took over the non-highway collections after Gen. Balao's death, was not giving a proper occounting to Mr. Marcos of the commissions received. Accordingly, Mr. Marcos asked me to investigate whether Mr. Genito was providing a fair accounting, and I asked my assistant, Oscar Rodriguez, to perform such an accounting. This required gathering from the Japanese traders and my records and Mr. Marcos' records all information about commissions collected by General Balao. Mr. Rodriguez, under my direction, then prepared schedules concerning commissions collected by General Balao and Mr. Genito. Copies of some of these schedules are attached hereto as Exhibit D. From my analysis of these records when they were prepared, together with my conversations with General Balao, Mr. Genito, and Mr. Marcos, it was clear that General Balao was collecting these commissions, among others, for Mr. Marcos.

I am further aware, from my conversations in approximately 1975 through 1977 with General Balao and the Japanese traders, that the commissions received by General Balao on Mr. Marcos' behalf related in large part to contracts given to the Japanese traders under the Japanese Reparations program, pursuant to which the Japanese government pledged to provide the Philippine government with approximately \$550 million to spend on contracts for goods and services with Japanese suppliers of merchandise and services. In contrast, the commissions which I received for Mr. Marcos were based on contracts obtained pursuant to the Japanese Assitance Loan, also known sometimes as the OECF loan.

The Japanese companies that paid commissions to Mr. Marcos through General Balmo, Mr. Genito, and myself under the Japanese Reparations Fund and the Japanese Assistance loan included Sakai, Sumitomo, Toyo Trading, Nisshio-Iwai, Mitsui, Murubeni, and C. Itoh. I recall that the representative of Sakai from whom I received commissions for Mr. Marcos was Sasuno Makino. I also recall receiving commissions for Mr. Marcos from a Mr. Sato, on behalf of Sumitomo. I also recall that a representative of Marubeni who was involved in the payment of such commissions to Mr. Marcos was Mr. Sueo Adachi. A similar role was performed by Yoshio Kotake on behalf of Toyo Trading.

Whenever I would receive commissions on behalf of Mr.
Marcos, I would bring the receipts to Mr. Marcos at
Malacapang Palace. Mr. Marcos instructed me to keep the
receipt of these commissions absolutely secret, and stated
that I could not even tell my wife. During the period of
time when I was conducting this business on behalf of Mr.
Marcos, I wrote him the letter attached as Exhibit "I", for

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the purpose of assuring him that I would not ever reveal any of the dealings I conducted for him with these Japanese traders.

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- 9. When General Balao died in August 1977, Mr. Kotake of Toyo wrote a letter to Mr. Marcos indicating that if I were appointed as the new "collector" for Mr. Marcos of commissions paid by Japanese trading companies doing business under the Reparations Fund or Japanese Assistance Loan, this could create a scandal similar to the Lockheed scandal that drove former Japanese Premier Tanaka from office. I recall learning of this letter sometime shortly after General Balao's death sometime in 1977, although I do not recall ever seeing it. In response, on November 22, 1977, I wrote and delivered to Mr. Marcos the letter attached hereto as Exhibit F, seeking instructions as to whether I should continue my Department of Public Highway collection activities on Mr. Marcos' behalf, and seeking clarification on who would handle the commissions being received by other agencies.
- 10. At no time during any of the above described activities on behalf of Mr. Marcos did I keep for myself or any member of my family any of the funds I received from the Japanese businessmen on behalf of Mr. Marcos. I deposited all such funds in to Mr. Marcos' bank account, pursuant to his instructions.

- 2. Among the receipts I mentioned in that Second Supplemental Affidavit is --

"J) An undated note stating that Secretary Aquino collected from M. Makino US\$350,000."

- 4. I declare under oath that I deposited that amount, like all other amounts I received from Makino, with the Swiss Eank Corporation in Hongkong for the account of former President Ferdinand Marcos upon the latter's instruction.

I, BALTAZAR AQUINO, of legal age, married and with residence at 51 Times St., Queson City, MM after being duly sworn in accordance with law, do hereby depose and say:

1. That sometime on July 3, 1986, I submitted my thru Raul Daza;

- 2. That in addition to the narration of facts in the aforesaid affidavit, I wish to add the following:
 - a) That after my retirement from government service on July 3, 1979, I was asked by Mr. Marcos to go to Malacanang to seek my advice on some infrastructure projects being undertaken by the government.
 - During that time, I needed the assistance of Mr. Marcos in connection with the threatened foreclosure of Mayon Imperial Hotel by the Government Service Insurance System. After exchanging of Mayon Imperial Hotel. The President promised to help but nothing came out of his promise inasmuch as Mayon Imperial Hotel was also taken over by the GSIS.
 - c) That en the same occasion, Mr. Marcos asked me to go to Hongkong to receive for him certain amounts from the Japanese representative, Mr. Dusumo Makino. I acceded to this request inasmuch as I was also confronted with the Mayon Imperial motel problem and Mr. Marcos was the only one in a position to help me with the said problem. Insofar as I can recall, I continue to receive for Mr. Marcos certain amounts from Mr. Susumo Makino up to 1981.

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3. That I likewise state that I have no dollar account with any Swiss Bank or with any foreign bank. Pre-viusly, I maintained a dollar account with the Bank of Amedica in California but I closed the same sometime in the same to Josefa Imperial Aquino as my wedding gift to her.
